This year we are adding the talents of Piano Fondue, a Dueling Piano act which has delighted audiences of all types around

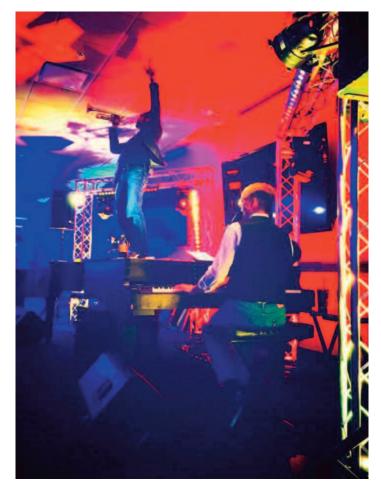
the country with their class, style, and a whole lot more!

Family Services has partnered with the City of Beloit, the Beloit Public Library, the School District of Beloit and others to bring "Little" Little Free Libraries to more neighborhoods in Beloit, with a specific goal of providing free books to kids.

Research shows that reading is fundamental to brain development and that early literacy and reading to very young children and is crucial for language advancement and creating a positive bond between parent and child.

Students at Beloit Memorial High School created 22 little free library kits that are being distributed to interested participants. Several individuals and organizations have already begun assembling and decorating their kits.

Stephanie Guetschow, director of the Home Companion Registry, a program of Family Services, says that there is much to learn from working with senior citizens. Through their stories, she has traveled through time and has seen the world in a whole new light. "Being a part of their lives in times of need is such a wonderful feeling," says Stephanie.

Stephanie was born and raised in Beloit, graduated from FJ Turner High School, then got a Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Carthage College. After graduation, she explored finding her place in the world by working in a variety of fields such as corrections and child foster care. In 2001, she became a Social Service Assistance at Oak Crest Retirement Community in DeKalb, IL.

It was here that she realized her true passion - working with the elderly. In 2006, she joined the Beloit Health and Rehabilitation Center's Social Services Team where she worked in short term rehab and was responsible for discharge planning.

In 2015, she became the director of the Home Companion Registry where she works to provide supportive and assistive services to the elderly, ill and disabled, allowing them to remain in their homes through the help of home companions. "Long term care has been one of the most rewarding opportunities. I have been blessed with crossing paths with so many seniors who have let me

into their lives as a caregiver, a social worker and even as a friend," Stephanie explains.

Stephanie carefully assesses the needs of the seniors and the strengths of the personal care providers. By matching needs and strengths, both parties benefit from the service relationship.

Stephanie is married and has two children at home. She enjoys staying in with family, relaxing with a movie or doing puzzles. In the summer, she and her family go camping where they enjoy biking and hiking.

SEXUAL ASSAULT SURVIVOR HAS FOUND INNER STRENGTH, RESOLVE, TENACITY AND HOPE »

"Ann" is a childhood survivor of sexual abuse. She has been receiving services from SARP since July 2015 and has made great strides in her healing journey. Ann has always been artistic, but it wasn't until she started healing from her trauma that she "got her voice back." Several months into her journey she began utilizing drawing and painting as a coping skill and as a means of processing her overwhelming emotions. In the beginning, her artwork exhibited deep anger and sadness.

When she painted herself, it was only a bare-bones sketch—highlighting how far she had withdrawn from herself. Months later, and after dozens of advocacy and support group sessions, her art features much more positive and uplifting depictions of herself. In one painting, she is shown greeting her inner child. Her latest piece of artwork features a butterfly—a symbol of life and rebirth.

She is now working toward raising community awareness about sexual vio-

lence. Her artwork was displayed anonymously at the Beloit Public Library in honor of Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April, 2016. We know many people benefit from her powerful statement.

PET THERAPY AT FAMILY SERVICES: A NEW APPROACH TO HELPING CLIENTS»

Four legged animals and humans have co-existed for thousands of years—long enough for dogs to earn the title of 'Man's Best Friend'. Therefore, it is no surprise that dogs have become a resource for staff in the healthcare field. A growing number of hospitals, nursing homes and counseling centers have added 'pet therapy' to their rosters as one of the many ways of helping clients de-stress during hard times.

Formally known as Animal Assisted Therapy, this practice has been increasing in popularity over the past fifteen years, but has been around since the late nineteenth century. Florence Nightingale and Sigmund Freud both used animals while treating to patients. Nightingale wrote of its benefits in her diary, noting how children and adults in psychiatric hospitals felt joy playing with small animals. Freud would bring

his dog Jofi along to private therapy sessions, convinced that the Chinese chow chow could sense a client's level of tension. Today, Animal Assisted Therapy has been reported to be particularly effective in improving social and communication skills and mood, helping with anxiety involving eating disorders, facilitating independent living, and improving empathetic skills.

At Family Services, Individual and Family Counseling Program counselor Jenifer Jelinek's American Staffordshire mix, Luka, has been visiting clients several days a week since August of 2016. Having a dog in the office has proven to be a great topic of conversation for both staff and clients as it is not everyday a friendly four-legged animal is seen roaming the offices. Although Luka is a relatively new addition to Family Services, her presence has already been

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, JOHN PFLEIDERER»



We know that the opportunities for improving our communities remain close at hand. We also understand that the problems that undermine the healthy

growth of communities are complex, usually interconnected, and sprinkled with unforeseen setbacks.

Communities thrive when there are collective, coordinated, mindful, and effective efforts to create meaningful and lasting change. We believe that our programs have a role to play, a role that is often essential but not always sufficient in and of itself to create the lasting changes we desire. We will continue to work with our clients to

find the additional resources to thrive. Here's what our programs are working on to contribute to that change:

- 1. The Beloit Domestic Violence Survivor Center is committed to increasing the number of individuals receiving nonshelter based (community outreach) services;
- 2. The Counseling program is focused on increasing our counseling presence in critical need census tracts within Beloit;
- 3. The Home Companion Registry is working to increase our capacity to serve families and individuals affected by dementia;
- 4. CASA's goal is to increase capacity to serve child abuse victims by increasing the active roster of volunteer advocates to 50.
- 5. The Sexual Assault Recovery Program is strategically advancing its efforts to

reach additional adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse;

- 6. Life Financial Solutions (formerly CCCS Beloit Janesville) is focused on increasing financial counseling services to families facing multiple stressors; and
- 7. Youth2Youth will continue it effort to contribute to the decline of youth-reported use of alcohol, tobacco, E-cigarettes, non-prescribed prescription medications, and marijuana.

We will check back with you later in the year to let you know how well we were able to move our part of "the needle" in a positive direction.

SERVICES AT THE BELOIT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVOR CENTER HAVE EXPANDED, VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED»

The Beloit Domestic Violence Survivor Center (BDVSC) has been a shelter for women and children who have left their homes due to domestic violence for many years. However, the services for victims go way beyond a safe place to stay. Everyone receiving services, whether residing in the shelter or in the community, has access to a case manager for support and assistance in achieving their goals.

Now these services are available to male victims of domestic and sexual abuse as well. A demographic often overlooked, male victims now have access to counseling, case management and a support group. Services to all clients also include housing assistance, legal advocacy, and the capacity to provide outreach services (e.g., to the hospital) around the clock.

Due to the expansion of its services, the BDVSC has several opportunities

for community members to support those in need. Program Director, Kelsey Hood-Christenson and staff are working to develop a comprehensive Community Response Team that will provide on-call support for victims who have contact with law enforcement and/or medical services. These volunteers will provide immediate support to victims and link them to the Center for on-going services as appropriate.

BDVSC is also looking for the following volunteers:

- Crisis Call Volunteers to assist, advocate, and provide referrals to clients who call the crisis line
- Child Care Volunteers to provide child care on an "as needed" basis for clients in shelter
- Support Group Volunteers to provide group counseling to both men and women victims of domestic abuse,

- Facility Volunteers to sort donations and assist with facility upkeep, and
- Event Volunteers to assist with developing affirming events for clients as well as public information and/or fundraising events.

Our volunteers receive comprehensive training so they can deliver fair, sensitive and competent services to all victims of domestic violence.

Y2Y 4 CHANGE CELEBRATES 25 YEARS OF SERVICE»



The Youth 2 Youth 4 Change coalition recently celebrated 25 years of service. Program Director, Debbie Fisher noted, "We have had over 5,000 young people act as youth advocates since 1995 when the youth program was developed, and every year over 200 teens serve in this capacity, educating 6,000 elementary through high school students about the dangers of drug misuse and abuse."

These youth advocates utilize evidence-based, age-appropriate and interactive approaches which resonate with students. While the coalition is involved in many issues including tobacco control, alcohol and prescription drugs, one of its major concerns is youth marijuana use. The youth advocates have embraced this challenge and have implemented a training program that is making an impact.

"Through the coalition's training efforts, students know that tobacco use can cause cancer and how the industry hid that fact from the public. They know

that some of the same toxins and carcinogens found in cigarette smoke are also present in marijuana smoke," reiterates Fischer.

As a result of their efforts, from 2014-2016, there has been an 8 percent decrease in reported marijuana use among Beloit's high school students. Unfortunately data also points to the fact that there has been an ncrease in marijuana use among middle schoolers.

"While this information is disheartening, we know that data drives our efforts, not the other way around," says Fischer. "We will be launching our marijuana education program to our elementary school students so by the time these students reach middle school, they will be well-prepared for the decisions they may face."

Such activities could be not achieved without community support and a strong foundation. Indeed, Youth2Youth 4 Change is proud of the fact that all sectors are represented and engaged; there are strong youth/adult partnerships; and coalition goals and activities are achievable, action-oriented and evaluated. As a result of these strategies, there has been:

- A reduction in youth substance misuse
- An increase in tobacco and alcohol compliance in Rock County and Beloit
- Passage of community smoke-free air ordinances, and the coalition is assisting with the implementation of the Wisconsin Smokefree Ordinance
- Passage of multiple e-cigarette regulations for Rock County schools and communities
- Passage of a Beloit Township social host ordinance

Fischer attributes the success to their model of including youth in all aspects of the coalition – they know how to talk to their peers and younger youth, and they have a voice that can and does, get heard. Reprinted in part from CADCA.org
